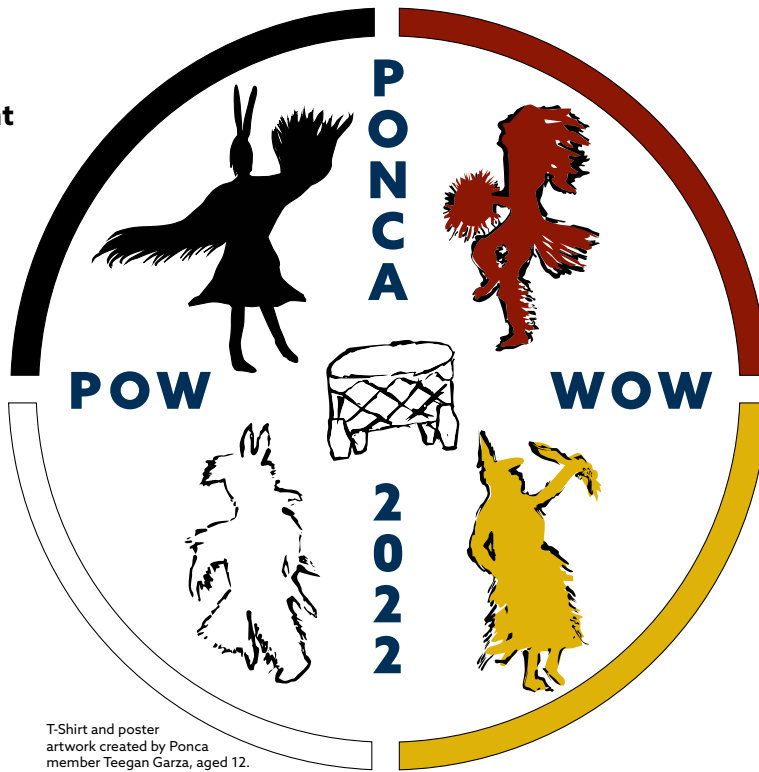

Saturday, August 13 | 9-11 am

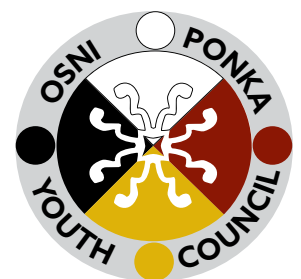

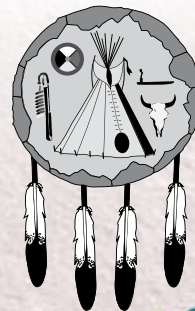

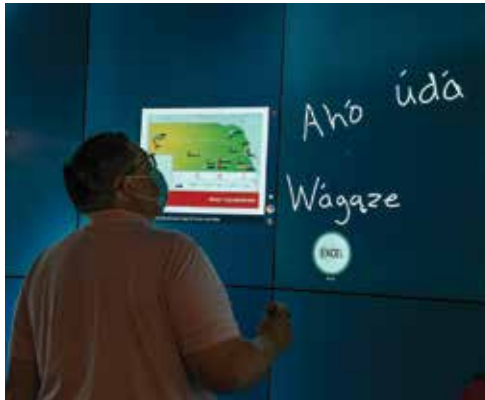

Ponca youth and Elders sample college experience at Wagaze event

Ponca students had a unique opportunity to get a glimpse into college life at the Wagaze conference, held in conjunction with UNO, UNMC, and MCC. Students, Ponca Elders, and staff toured campuses, while learning more about potential career paths and options for higher education.



Ponca Elder's art provides uniting thread for Wagaze event



Ponca Tribal Elder and local artist Brenda Bogacz' artwork was the focal point of an educational summit for tribal youth, sponsored by the GO Network of Omaha and the Ponca Tribe of Nebraska. The three-day youth summit, called



“Wagaze,” which means “to learn” in Ponca, was held at the University of Nebraska at Omaha, the

University of Nebraska Medical Center, and Metro Community College.

Bogacz' art, centered around the Ponca legend, “Orphan Boy,” and featuring “Chief Bird,” along with several design elements, was used on each campus for printed materials, on video screens, and in an informational booklet the students used throughout the week.

The artwork was also displayed prominently on a two-story video screen inside the Davis Global Center at the University of Nebraska Medical Center during a campus visit by Ponca youth and elders, as a way to honor the Tribe's culture.

JOM Parent Committee works to further education for Native youth

The Tribe's JOM Program is a grant-funded BIA program that is available in the NPS School District and greater Madison County (Nebraska school districts) to all eligible Native American K-12 students. JOM operates in conjunction with the school's Title VII Program and addresses the unique cultural needs of the Native American students with a parent committee helping to determine

those needs by conducting an annual needs assessment. The parent committee is comprised of parents, grandparents, and/or guardians that volunteer their time to help oversee the program along side PTON staff. Every year, the committee aims to celebrate the end of the school year with the students and their families as well as recognize the program's graduating seniors. The main

goals of the program are:

- To promote academic achievement;
- To improve attendance;
- To increase the graduation rate; and
- To promote a better understanding and greater awareness of Native American culture.

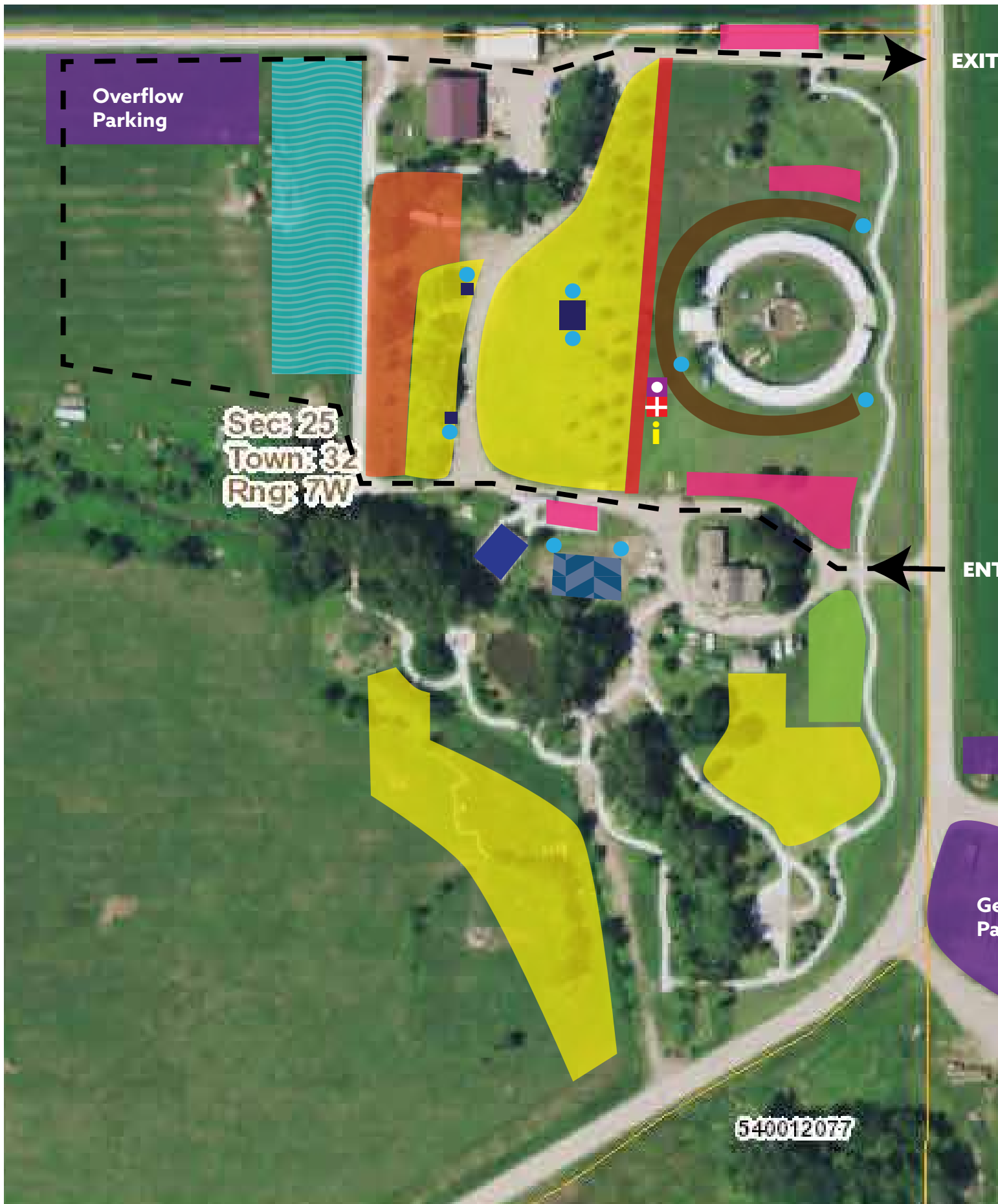

things. Often enjoying a meal and conversing with an elder will make you laugh and sometimes cry.

Above all, love our elders! Be patient and kind whenever you are in the presence of an elder. We can all learn from our elders in surprising and interesting ways. Enjoy time today and every day with an elder!

Ponca Tribe staff train in preparation to provide CPR and First Aid training

The Ponca Tribe of Nebraska has partnered with New View Training out of Omaha in its new Life Support Program. This new program is aimed at training all staff in Basic Life Support, CPR and First Aid. The Tribe hopes to offer Adult, Child and infant CPR to all members across the Service Delivery Area including youth and new and expecting mothers (Coming Soon).

The PTN Life Support Program instructors still need additional certification before we can offer this course to staff or members, so please be patient with this wonderful group.

The HeartSaver CPR courses are designed to teach the skills of adult, child and infant CPR to those with little or no

medical experience. The HeartSaver First Aid course teaches students the basics for the most common first aid emergencies including how to recognize them, how to call for help and how to perform some lifesaving skills. Upon completion of these courses, students will receive a certified American Heart Association course completion card valid for two years.

This is an exciting way for the Tribe to help keep its membership safe and prepared for an emergency in any setting. In these emergencies, every second counts. Having trained PTN staff helps ensure the safety to all of those visiting our various office sites, riding in our transportation vehicles, visiting our amazing casino and attending our events.

The Ponca Tribal Council will be reviewing proposed additions to the Law and Order Code. The revisions are being considered because the Tribal Council wants to provide the legal framework for organizing Partnerships and Cooperatives in order to expand the business sector in the territory of the Tribe.

There are changes being proposed are adding Titles 21 and 22. The revisions being considered include but are not limited to the following:

- Title 21 is a new Code that will govern Partnerships
- Title 22 is a new Code that will govern Cooperatives

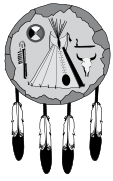
